

## Tributes to the Lifework of Gerry Goddard

“Gerry Goddard worked quietly, year after year, on a distant island far from the centers of academic and cultural power. But in that very seclusion his fine intelligence flourished and brought forth some of the most deeply thoughtful, philosophically rigorous writings that his chosen field has ever seen. The field he chose to serve with such dedication and insight was astrology: the most marginalized and scorned discipline of all, but one that he recognized held a great treasure for the modern spirit.
